## **Significant Protestant Beginnings:**

#### Pre-1900 Period

- 1555-1566 \*French Huguenot colony (Calvinists) established under French commander Nicolas Durand de Villegaignon; the first Protestant worship service was held in Brazil on 10 March 1557; the French were expelled by the Portuguese in 1566.
- 1624-1654 \*Dutch colony (Calvinists) and mission efforts on Northeast coast at Recife; the Dutch were expelled by the Portuguese in 1654.
- 1816 \*First Anglican chaplain arrived in Brazil at Rio de Janeiro; Robert C. Crane.
- 1817 \*British and Foreign Bible Society colporteurs
- 1822 \*First Anglican chapel was dedicated on 26 May in Rio de Janeiro to serve the expatriate community of mostly British citizens.
- 1824 **First German Lutheran immigrants** arrived in the Southern Region at São Leopoldo, Rio Grande do Sul, and Blumenan, Santa Catarina; first Lutheran Church was established at Nova Friburgo, Rio de Janeiro.
- 1835 **Methodist Episcopal Church of USA** (permanent work 1874) begins work: Rev. Justin Spaulding and Rev. Daniel Parish Kidder with their respective families.

- 1854 American Bible Society Agency established (1876)
- 1856 An encyclopedia of global Protestant missionary work, published in 1856, reported that the **American Seaman's Friend Society**, based in New York City, had established several chapels on the coast of southern Brazil, which targeted transitory merchant sailors rather than native Brazilians.
- 1858 Independent Congregational Church established by Scottish missionary doctor Robert Reid Kalley and his wife Sarah Poulton Kalley *Igreja Evangélica Fluminense*; today this church is known as the **Union of Congregational Churches of Brazil.**
- 1859 **Presbyterian Church USA (Northern),** missionary Ashbel Green Simonton; estabished the first Brazilian Presbyterian Church in the city of Río de Janeiro in 1862.
- 1861 \*Basel Missionary Society among German immigrants
- 1864 **German-speaking Lutheran parishes** of São Leopoldo (1864-1870) in Rio Grande do Sul and Nova Friburgo in Rio de Janeiro were supported by the Evangelical Church (Lutheran) of Prussia, the Basil Evangelical Missionary Society (Pietist, Lutherans and Reformed, founded in 1815 in Basel, Switzerland), and the Evangelical Society for Protestant Germans in America (Barmen, Germany).
- 1865 The Rev. José Manoel d Conceição, a former Roman Catholic priest, became the first Brazilian Presbyterian pastor for the **Presbyterian Church of Brazil.**
- 1867 Methodist pastor Junius Estaham Newman arrived in Rio de Janeiro and later relocated to Santa Bárbara d'Oeste, São Paulo state, where missionary Martha Watts founded the "Newman School" that later became Colégio Piracicabano in 1881, and formed the basis for the Universidade Metodista de Piracicaba in 1975.
- 1869 **Presbyterian Church (South)** begins work in Campinas among immigrants from the Southern U.S. states after the Civil War.
- 1870 **Southern Baptist Convention** (1881 permanent work), Foreign Mission Board, now under the International Mission Board; the first Baptist church was established in Santa Bárbara d'Oeste, São Paulo state, among Southerners from the USA.
- 1871 \*South American Missionary Society (SAMS-Anglican tradition)
- 1871 Methodist pastor Junius E. Newman established the first Methodist Church in Saltinho, São Paulo state, which was the beginning of the **Methodist Church of Brazil.**
- 1876 Methodist Episcopal Church (South) begins missionary work in Brazil
- 1878 **Plymouth Brethren** laymen establish the first "House of Prayer *Casa de Oração*" in the city of Rio de Janeiro.
- 1879 The **Brazilian Evangelical Church** was established by dissident members of the Presbyterian Church in Rio de Janeiro, with Miguel Vieira Ferreira as its pastor.
- 1880 Methodist Episcopal Church (North) begins missionary work in Brazil.
- 1882 The first Baptist church was organized in the city of Salvador, BA, with Zacarias C. Taylor as its pastor; this church became the cornerstone for the founding of the Brazilian Baptist Convention in 1907.among Brazilians.
- 1885 Bernardo de Miranda is ordained as the first Brazilian Methodist pastor.
- 1886 \*The Lutheran Synod of Rio Grandense in San Leopoldo, Rio Grande do Sul (Germanspeaking Lutherans), was founded; merged with other Lutheran synods in Brazil in 1949 and later formed the **Evangelical Church of the Lutheran Confession** in 1968.
- 1889 **Protestant Episcopal Church** established with the arrival of missionaries Lucien L. Kinsolving and James W. Morris in Porto Alegre, Rio Grande do Sul; this was the beginning of the Anglican-Episcopal Church of Brazil.
- 1889 **Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Brazil** founded, which was independent of the Northern and Southern Presbyterian Churches.
- 1892 \*Help for Brazil Mission, founded by Mrs. Robert Reid Kalley in Edinburgh, Scotland, begins work; became part of the Evangelical Union of South America (EUSA) in 1913.

- 1892 João Batista Pinheiro begins work in Barra do Corda, Maranhão state, in the northeastern region; this was the beginning of the **Alliance of Evangelical Christian Churches of Brazil** / *Alianca das Igrejas Cristas Evangelicas do* Brasil (AICEB).
- 1893 **First German Baptist church** established in Rio Grande do Sul among German immigrants; Frederick Leimann and Herman Gertner became well-known early leaders of this Baptist community, which was assisted by missionaries sent both from German Baptists in Germany and from German Baptists in the USA.
- 1894 The **Seventh-day Adventist Church** begins missionary work in the city of São Paulo, SP, with missionary Albert B. Stauffer; the first Adventist church in Brazil was founded in the city of Gaspar Alto, Santa Catarina state, in June 1895.
- 1895 The Lutheran Church in Brazil was founded.
- 1898 German Baptist Church established in Porto Alegre, Rio Grande do Sul: the *Deutsche Evangelische Baptistengemeinde* / **German Evangelical Baptist Community** was organized, based on the *Hamburg Confession of Faith*.

### 1900-1919 Period

- 1900 **Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod** begins missionary work; the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Brazil was founded in 1904 in São Pedro do Sul, RS.
- 1900 United Presbyterian Church established in São Paulo, which later became part of the **United Presbyterian Church in Brazil** in 1978.
- 1901 Canadian missionary Reginald Young begins work in the city of São Paulo, which is the beginning of the **Evangelical Christian Church of Brazil** / *Igreja Cristã Evangélica do Brasil* (ICEB).
- 1903 The **Presbyterian Church of Brazil** became divided and a new denomination was formed: the **Independent Presbyterian Church** / *Igreja Presbiteriana Independente do Brasil* (IPIB) under the leadership of the Rev. Eduardo Carlos Pereira.
- 1904 The Baptist Convention of São Paulo State was organized among Brazilians.
- 1905 **Dutch Reformed Church** established in Colombo, Paraná state.
- 1907 **The Brazilian Baptist Convention** was founded in the city of Salvador, Bahía state, by 32 delegates from 39 organized Baptist churches among Brazilians.
- 1907 \*Christian Missions in Many Lands (Plymouth Brethren) sent its first missionaries.
- 1910 Italian Pentecost missionary Louis Francesconi, from Chicago, Illinois, begins work in Santo Antônio da Platina, Paraná state, on 20 April; this becomes the foundation for the establishment of the **Christian Congregation of Brazil** / Congregação Cristã no Brasil (CCB), which was the first Pentecostal denomination founded in Brazil.
- 1910 Swedish Pentecostal missionaries Gunnar Vingren and Daniel Berg from South Bend, Indiana, begin work in the city of Belém, Pará state, near the mouth of the Amazon River, on 19 November; this becomes the foundation for the formal establishment of the Evangelical Assemblies of God Church of Brazil / Igreja Evangélica Assembleia de Deus (IEAD) in 1918; the U.S. based Assemblies of God General Conference did not begin its work in Brazil until 1925.
- 1911 Gospel Missionary Union (GMU)
- 1911 Evangelical Reformed Churches of Brazil (Dutch immigrants)
- 1911 The **Evangelical Union of South America (EUSA)** was formed in 1911 in Liverpool, England, from two existing missions operating in South America: the sections of **Regions Beyond Missionary Union** (founded in 1873 in London, England) working in Argentina and Peru; and the **South American Evangelical Mission** (founded in 1895 in Toronto, Canada) working in Argentina and Brazil. The **Help for Brazil Mission** joined the EUSA in 1913.

- 1912 Swedish missionary Erik Jansson begins work among Swedish immigrants in Guarani das Missões, Rio Grande do Sul, which became the origin of the **Convention of Independent Baptist Churches** / Convenção das Igrejas Batistas Independentes (CIBI).
- 1913 **South America Indian Mission** (now, South America Mission), also the Canadian South American Mission, began missionary work.
- 1913 British missionary Oliver Walkey began his ministry in Manaus, Amazonas, until 1921; he founded the **West Amazon Mission** in 1951 and returned to Brazil at age 71.
- 1913 Thirteen local churches that originated from the missionary work of Dr. Kalley met to establish the **Union of Evangelical Congregational Churches of Brazil** / *União das Igrejas Evangélicas Congregacionais do Brasil* (UIECB).
- 1913 The **Seventh-day Baptist Church** was founded in Paraná state, among former members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.
- 1915 Holiness missionary Takeo Monobe from Japan began work among Japanese immigrants in São Paulo state, sponsored by the Japan Holiness Church; this work became independent of Japan in 1934 as the Evangelical Holiness Mission of Brazil.
- 1918 The formal establishment of the **Evangelical Assemblies of God Church** (IEAD), under the leadership of Swedish Pentecostal missionary Gunnar Vingren.
- 1918 Southern Baptist missionary Joseph F. Brandon begins work in the city of Cruzeiro do Sul, Acre state; later, one of his disciples—Francisco Santiago—begins work in the city of Manaus, Amazonas state, where he later founded five Baptist churches.

#### 1920-1929 Period

- 1920 Missionaries of the Evangelical Congregation Church of Argentina arrived to begin work in Brazil; the formal establishment of this denomination, the Evangelical Congregational Churches of Brazil, took place in 1942 under the leadership of Pastor Karl Spittler, among others.
- 1922 \*The Salvation Army, UK
- 1922 United Church Board for World Ministry
- 1923 Church of God (Anderson, IN)
- 1923 Baptist Faith Missions
- 1925 The **General Council of the Assemblies of God**, USA, begins missionary work in coordination with the **Evangelical Assemblies of God of Brazil**, founded in 1910 and legally incorporated in 1918, under the leadership of Swedish Pentecostals.
- 1925 \*Pentecostal Missionary Union of the UK and Ireland (UK)
- 1926 \*Latvian and Russian-speaking Baptist churches established among immigrants in Rio Grande do Sul.
- 1927 Central Armenian Evangelical Church of São Paulo (Armenian immigrants)
- 1927 **Independent "church of Christ**" (non-instrumental = *a capella*) missionaries Orlando and Ethel Boyers and Virgil Smith arrived in the State of Pernambuco.
- 1928 Japanese immigrants established the first Free Methodist churches, and in 1936 the **Free Methodist Church Mission Board** in the U.S. sent its first missionaries.
- 1928 The **Caiuá Evangelical Mission** formed by North American missionaries Albert Sidney and Mabel Maxwell to reach the Amerindian peoples.

#### 1930-1939 Period

- 1930 The churches established by Swedish Pentecostal missionaries, beginning in 1910, were organized into an autonomous fellowship of churches, named the Assemblies of God of Brazil / Assembleias de Deus no Brasil, based on the Swedish model.
- 1930 The Methodist Church of Brazil was formally organized, with missionary John W. Tarboux as its first Bishop; it becomes autonomous from the Methodist Church in the USA.
- 1930 \*The first German-speaking Mennonite refugees arrive from Russia and establish congregations of the **Mennonite Brethren Church** and the **General Conference Mennonite Church** in Santa Catarina state.
- 1931 **Unevangelized Fields Mission**, now UFM International: a group of 36 independent mission workers serving in Brazil and the Belgium Congo formed this new mission service agency with headquarters in London, UK.
- 1932 Dissident members of the Evangelical Assemblies of God Church left to organize the **Church of Christ of Brazil** / *Igreja de Cristo no Brasil* (ICB), under the leadership of Pastor Manoel Higino de Souza in the city of Mossoró, Rio Grande do Norte.
- 1932 The **Adventist Church of Promise** / *Igreja Adventista da Promessa* (IAP) was founded in the city of Recife, Pernambuco state, in the northeastern region; it was formed by Adventists who had become Pentecostals and left the Seventh-Day Adventist Church.
- 1932 \*Christian Reformed Church of Brazil (ICRB) established among Hungarian immigrants.
- 1933 \*Reformed Evangelical Churches in Brazil (IERB) formed among Dutch immigrants.
- 1934 Evangelical Holiness Church (Japanese immigrants and their descendants).
- 1934 The Evangelical Confederation of Brazil was established.
- 1934 Calvary Pentecostal Church (CPC) entered Brazil in 1934; however, in 1955, CPC (organized in Olympia, Washington, by former Assemblies of God ministers in 1931) and its affiliated churches in Brazil merged with the Church of God (Cleveland, TN = COGCT).
- 1934 The Orthodox Methodist Church was founded by Pastor José Henríquez da Matta in the city of Belo Horizonte, Mato Grosso do Sul, among dissidents from the Methodist Church of Brazil.
- 1935 U.S. missionary Horace S. Ward arrived in the city of Rio de Janeiro; he established the first congregation of the **Pentecostal Church of Christ** / *Igreja de Cristo Pentecostal no Brasil* (ICPB) in the city of Serra Talhada, Pernambuco state.
- 1935 \*Norwegian Pentecostal pastor C. Leonard Pettersen was appointed a missionary to Brazil under the sponsorship of the **Filadelfia Church Mission**, with financial support from a church in Arvika, Sweden, funneled through the Stockholm Filadelfia Church, and the Norwegian Pentecostal Church "Salen" in Ski.
- 1935 Baptist Mid-Missions begins work.
- 1936 The Free Methodist Church was established in the city of São Paulo by missionaries Daniel Masayoshi Nishizumi and Hiroyuki Hayashi from the Free Methodist Church of Japan.
- 1939 Brazil Gospel Fellowship Mission
- 1939 U.S. missionaries Harland and Hazel Graham arrived in Manaus, Amazonas, where later they established the **Evangelical Pentecostal Mission of Brazil** / *Missão Evangélica Pentecostal do Brasil* (MEPB).
- 1939 Association of Baptists for World Evangelization (ABWE)

#### 1940-1949 Period

- 1940s General Association of Regular Baptists (GARB)
- 1940s **Gospel Missionary Union** (GMU, with headquarters in Kansas City, MO) began work in the Northeastern region.
- 1940 **Conservative Presbyterian Church of Brazil** (IPCB) founded by Pastor Bento Ferraz in São Paulo as a split from the Independent Presbyterian Church (IPI).
- 1941 Child Evangelism Fellowship
- 1942 **The Evangelical Congregational Churches of Brazil** was formally organized by missionaries of the same denomination in Argentina.
- 1944 Mennonite Brethren Missions and Services
- 1945 Brazilian Gospel Fellowship Mission (BGFM, with headquarters in Springfield, IL).
- 1945 International Church of the Foursquare Gospel begins work.
- 1946 Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society, now CBInternational
- 1946 \*Elim Evangelical Pentecostal Church / Igreja Evangélica Pentecostal Elim do Brasil (IEPE) begins work with missionaries Henry and Edith Jeffery from the UK.
- 1947 Pastors Mário Roberto Lindstrom, Oswaldo Fuentes and Alídio Flora Agostinho organized the Evangelical Church of Biblical Revival / Igreja Evangélica de Avivamento Bíblico (IEAB) after leaving the Methodist Church of Brazil because of their Pentecostal beliefs and practices, which began to form in September 1946 in the courtyard of the Methodist Seminary in São Bernardo do Campo, São Paulo state.
- 1948 Pilgrim Fellowship Inc.
- 1948 Independent Board of Presbyterian Foreign Missions (IBPFM) begins work.
- 1948 The Brazil Christian Mission (BCM) is affiliated with the Christian Church and Churches of Christ (instrumental): missionaries Lloyd David and Ruth Sanders arrived in the city of Rio de Janeiro to begin work; the first Church of Christ was founded in the city of Goiânia, Goiás state, in 1949.
- 1949 Grace Brethren International Missions
- 1949 The **Brazilian Christian Convention** / Convenção Igrejas de Cristo no Brasil and is supported by the Christian Churches / Churches of Christ in the USA.
- 1949 **The Amazon Valley Christian Mission** was founded in 1949 and is supported by the Christian Churches / Churches of Christ in the USA.
- 1949 \*Evangelical Church of the Lutheran Confession was formed as a merger of several German-speaking Lutheran synods.

#### 1950-1959 Period

- 1950 Youth For Christ, USA
- 1951 \*British missionary Oliver Walkey founded the **West Amazon Mission** in 1951 and returned to Brazil at age 71; previously he served in the Amazon region (Manaus, Amazonas), from 1919-1921.
- 1951 **The International Church of the Foursquare Gospel:** missionary Harold Edwin Williams from the USA and Peruvian Pastor Jesus Hermírio Vásquez Ramos began their work in the city of São João da Boa Vista, São Paulo state.
- 1951 The **Church of God** (Cleveland, TN = COGCT) / *Igreja de Deus no Brasil* (IDB) officially began its ministry in Brazil in 1951 after an independent Swiss missionary, Albert J. Widmer, joined this denomination.
- 1952 Baptist Bible Fellowship International
- 1952 During the 1950s, Brazil experienced significant Pentecostal growth and expansion, mainly due a "spiritual revival movement" that began at a local congregation of the **Independent Presbyterian Church** in the Cambuci district of São Paulo, where

- Pentecostal missionaries Harold Williams and Raymond Boatright held an evangelistic crusade with supernatural manifestations, such as the "baptism in the Holy Spirit," "speaking in tongues," miraculous healings, and other "signs and wonders."
- 1952 \*Convention of Independent Baptist Churches is organized, which traces its origin to missionary Erik Jansson of the *Örebro Missionsforening* (Örebro Mission Foundation of Sweden) in 1912, among Swedish immigrants who founded agricultural colonies in the municipality of Guarani das Missões, State of Rio Grande do Sul.
- 1953 Baptist Missionary Association of America (BMAA) begins work.
- 1953-1954 Pentecostal missionaries Harold Williams and Raymond Boatright led the *Cruzada Nacional de Evangelização* / **National Evangelization Crusade**, which had its beginning in the city of São Paulo and spread throughout the entire nation; "the movement grew in a continuous wave and wherever they held a tent crusade a new group was formed, which later would become a new Pentecostal church."
- 1953 **Voice of Truth Ministry** was founded by former Methodist Pastor Fued Moysés in the city of São Paulo.
- 1953 **The Christian Renewal Church** / *Igreja Renovadora Cristã* (IRC) founded in the city of São Paulo by Aldo Ferretti, formerly with the Christian Congregation of Brazil.
- 1953 New Tribes Mission of Brazil (NTM) began its ministry in Goiânia (GO).
- 1954 Arabic Evangelical Church of São Paulo among Lebanese immigrants.
- 1954 Free Will Baptist Association
- 1954 \*Missionary Fred Orr arrived in Boca do Acre, Amazonas, from Belfast, Ireland, to begin work under the **Acre Gospel Mission (now Acre International)**, a nondenominational mission agency founded in Ireland in 1937.
- 1954 **The Mennonite Church / Mennonite Board of Missions and Charities** begins work in São Paulo state; the *Aliança Evangélica Menonita*, Brazil (AEM), Evangelical Mennonite Alliance, is the Portuguese-speaking conference of Mennonites in Brazil.
- 1955 Brethren who left the Cambuci Independent Presbyterian Church held a General Assembly that established the **First Evangelical Church of Cambuci**, which later founded several other churches that over the years became independent Pentecostals.
- 1955 Evangelical Pentecostal Church "Brazil for Christ" / Igreja Evangélica Pentecostal "O Brasil Para Cristo" (OBPC) was founded in São Paulo by Manuel de Melo, formerly a pastor with the Foursquare Gospel Church.
- 1955 **Oriental Missionary Society,** now OMS International, begins work among Japanese immigrants and their descendants.
- 1955 **Baptist General Conference** (Swedish heritage from the USA)
- 1955 World Partners of the Missionary Church; the United Missionary Church of Brazil.
- 1955 Mennonite Board of Missions & Charities / Mennonite Missions Network
- 1955 Calvary Pentecostal Church (CPC) had entered Brazil in 1934; however, in 1955, CPC (organized in Olympia, Washington, by former Assemblies of God ministers in 1931) and its affiliated churches in Brazil merged with the Church of God (Cleveland, TN = COGCT).
- 1956 Amazon Valley Indian Mission (Mennonite)
- 1956 Wycliffe Bible Translators / Summer Institute of Linguistics (SIL)
- 1956 **United Pentecostal Church International** (Oneness) began its work in the city of Porto Alegre, Rio Grande do Sul, under the leadership of missionary Samuel Baker.
- 1956 **Fundamentalist Presbyterian Church** (led by Dr. Israel Gueiros, northeastern region)
- 1957 CMF International
- 1957 **West Indies Mission** (now WorldTeam), a non-denominational mission agency, began work in Dourados, Mato Grosso, with the arrival of Lowell and Katherine Bailey who collaborated with the *Missão Evangélica* Caiuá / **Caiuá Evangelical Mission**, the only Brazilian mission working with the Amazonian Native American Indians at that time.

- 1957 Grace Ministries International
- 1957 The Pentecostal Christian Church of Evangelization and Divine Healing / Igreja Cristã Pentecostal de Evangelização e Cura Divina was officially founded by Pastor Leonel da Silva (1910-2013) on 26 May 1957. The church was installed at the top of Vila Maria in a rented hall in the city of São Paulo, where the pastor began "a ministry of evangelization and divine healing." This church grew and prospered in that place, and on 13 May 1958, the title "Wonders of Jesus" was added to its name. In 1960 there was a division in the ministry and the discontented pastor Leonel Silva called a General Assembly for 28 February 1960, where a majority of the members who attended decide leave and organize the "Marvels of Jesus Independent Pentecostal Christian Church" / Igreja Cristã Pentecostal Independente Maravilhas de Jesus. It was in this church on 6 July 1958, that the Rev. David Martins Miranda (1936-2015), later founder of the Pentecostal Church God is Love (IPDA), was first converted.
- 1957 Missionary Aviation Fellowship, known in Brazil as Wings of Relief / Asas de Socorro.
- 1957 **Independent** "**church of Christ**" (non-instrumental = *a capella*) mission work began in the São Paulo metropolitan area with the arrival of Arlie and Alma Smith; a group of 15 missionary families arrived three years later, in 1960, that had a large impact on church planting in São Paulo.
- 1957 The **Christian Missionary Fellowship** was founded in 1949 and is supported by the Christian Churches / Churches of Christ in the USA.
- 1958 Swiss Evangelical Church formed among Swiss Reformed immigrants in Sao Paulo.
- 1958 The **Church of the Nazarene** / *Igreja Nazareno no Brasil* (INB) was founded by missionaries Earl and Gladys Mosteller in the city of Campinas, SP.
- 1958 The **Christian Apostolic Church** / *Igreja Apostólica Cristã* (IAC) was founded by Pastor Adonias Roque de Souza in Rio de Janeiro, who formerly was associated with the Foursquare Gospel Church.
- 1958 Weslevan World Missions / The Weslevan Church
- 1958 Evangelical Lutheran Church (USA)
- 1958 Things To Come Mission, Inc.
- 1958 The interdenominational **Brazil Inland Mission** (BIM), founded in Illinois, USA, in 1955, was incorporated in Brazil as "*A Missão Interior do Brasil*," with work in the southern and central regions.
